JULY PRESENTATION

Dr. Jeffrey Bozanic

Inside the Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber: Real-Life Diving Emergencies, Treatment, and Lessons from Antarctica

Every diver has heard of the Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber—but few have had the opportunity to learn what actually happens behind its doors. Join Dr. Jeffrey Bozanic, Hyperbaric Chamber Supervisor and 37-year volunteer with the USC Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber, for an engaging behind-the-scenes look at one of the region's busiest diving recompression facilities. Through dramatic real-life case histories, photos, and practical explanations, you'll learn how diving injuries occur, how hyperbaric oxygen saves lives, and what every diver can do to reduce the risk of ever needing a chamber.



The presentation will include stories from Dr. Bozanic's time managing the recompression chamber at McMurdo Station, Antarctica, along with highlights from his recent scientific expeditions to the Antarctic Peninsula. He will conclude with a preview of his December 2027 Antarctica expedition, where divers and non-divers alike will have the opportunity to explore one of the most spectacular and remote places on Earth while participating in scientific research and citizen science projects. Whether you're a new diver or have thousands of dives, you'll leave with knowledge that could one day save your life—or your dive buddy's.



Speaker Bio: Jeffrey Bozanic is an internationally recognized technical diving educator, explorer, author, and hyperbaric specialist with more than four decades of experience in diving medicine, scientific diving, and expedition leadership. He has served as a volunteer with the Catalina Hyperbaric Chamber since 1989 (more than 37 years) and is currently a Hyperbaric Chamber Supervisor, providing emergency recompression treatment and training for injured divers.

Dr. Bozanic also managed the recompression chamber at McMurdo Station, Antarctica, where he supported the U.S. Antarctic scientific diving program. He has participated in numerous Antarctic expeditions, including leading a 2026 Explorers Club Flag Expedition, and is currently organizing a youth- and science-focused expedition to Antarctica in December 2027. His presentation combines decades of operational hyperbaric experience with firsthand stories from one of the region's busiest diving recompression facilities and from the polar regions.

Member Dive Report:

Tales From a Marvelous Red Sea Trip

When people ask about my favorite place to dive, I never hesitate—the Red Sea wins every time. The coral, the fish, the wrecks... nothing compares. I've been fortunate to dive there twice, most recently this May, joined by 17 wonderful dive buddies, including several CID club members: Donald Lockwood, Heather Moine, Laura Forsyth, Eric Taylor, Lauren McDonald, and Guy McVicker.

Our journey began with flights from LAX to Istanbul, then on to Hurghada, Egypt. On May 2nd, we boarded the *MY HERO*, a beautiful four-deck, 130-foot motor yacht built in 2018, and settled in for 14 unforgettable days of diving.



Diving Highlights

SS Thistlegorm Wreck: One of the crown jewels of the trip was the world-famous SS *Thistlegorm*. Often called the most popular wreck on the planet, it's easy to see why. The ship is remarkably intact, packed with WWII artifacts—including BSA M20 and Norton 16H motorcycles, rifles, boots, tires, and even locomotives. The wreck lies between 52 and 105 feet, well within recreational limits. A German bomber sank her in the early hours of October 6, 1941, after dropping two bombs into the cargo hold. Of the 42 men aboard, 9 were lost. Diving this piece of history is both exhilarating and humbling.

Ras Mohammed National Park: We also spent several days exploring Ras Mohammed, home to some of the most spectacular hard and soft coral gardens I've ever seen. Visibility regularly exceeded 100 feet, and marine life was abundant. Sites along the Sinai Peninsula—including those near Sharm El-Sheikh and the Tiran Strait—were consistently breathtaking.

Salem Express: Another memorable dive was the *Salem Express*, a ferry that tragically sank on December 17, 1991. Although officially listed with 656 passengers and crew, the true number was likely over 1,600 pilgrims returning from Mecca. Only 180 survived. Diving this wreck was a solemn, reflective experience.

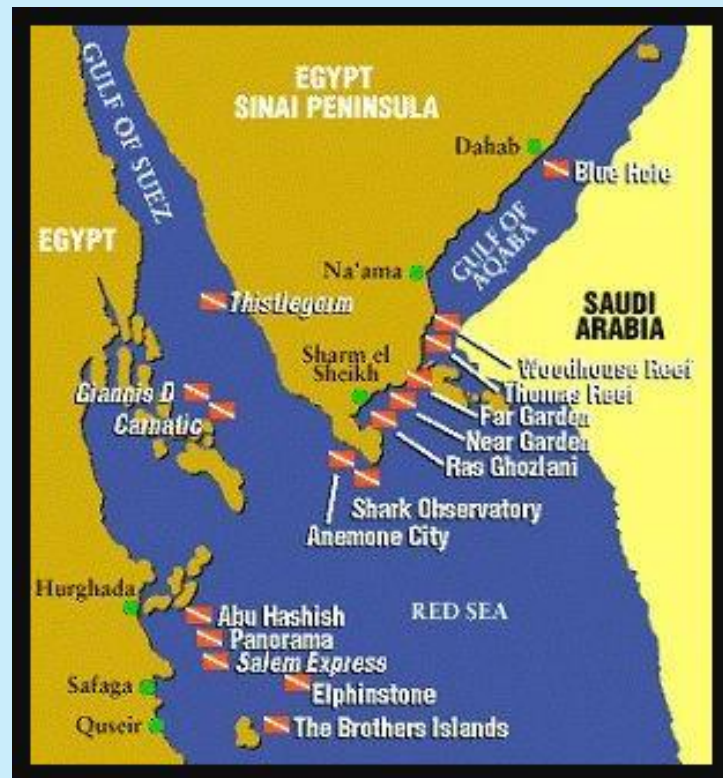
Favorite Sites & Daily Rhythm: Some of my personal favorites included Jackson Reef, Elphinstone Reef, Yolanda Reef, Sataya Reef, Abu Dabbab, and Marsa Shouna. One afternoon we even snorkeled with dolphins.

Water temperatures hovered in the mid- to high-70s—a bit cooler than expected—and we had several windy, choppy days, some with current but we made the most of every moment. With four dives offered daily, including night dives, we had up to 45 opportunities to explore.

Jordan: A Journey Through History: After our diving adventure, we traveled to Jordan for four days of sightseeing.

Highlights included:

- **Ajloun Castle** (1185), a remarkable hilltop fortress
- **Jerash**, one of the great cities of the Decapolis, where we toured the Arch of Triumph, Oval Plaza, Cardo, Colonnade, Temple of Aphrodite, and Roman Theater
- **Floating in the Dead Sea**, 538 feet below sea level
- **Petra**, capital of the Nabataeans, where we explored the iconic Treasury, Royal Tombs, Colored Tombs, and the Monastery
- **Wadi Rum**, the dramatic desert landscape associated with *Lawrence of Arabia*
- **St. George Church**, home to the oldest mosaic map of Palestine
- **Mount Nebo**, where Moses viewed the Promised Land



It was a powerful blend of natural beauty, ancient history, and cultural richness.

SC DIVING'S TRIP RECAP

PARADISE FOUND AT AKR ROATÁN 2026!

If you weren't on our sponsor's trip to Roatán this June, you missed a week of absolute paradise! A great crew from the club—including **me, Connie Mah, Don and Brandee Sisting**, and their friend **Patrick**—headed down to the iconic **Anthony's Key Resort (AKR)** for an unforgettable week of Caribbean diving. This trip was a blast to organize alongside **Robert Inglis** (SC Diving Founder & Lead Instructor), and I think it's safe to say we all had an incredible time.

We locked in AKR's full one-week dive package, maximizing our bottom time with a massive **19 boat dives**. Our schedule was a diver's dream: three boat dives a day from Sunday through Thursday, two on Friday, and two spectacular night dives. The resort logistics are down to a science—virtually every single dive site was within a quick, comfortable **10-minute boat ride** from the dock.

Perfect Conditions & Marine Highlights

The weather was warm, staying in the low-to-mid 80s, but a steady, refreshing breeze kept the infamous Roatán bugs entirely at bay. Underwater, things were just as perfect: a consistent **82°F water temperature** and pristine visibility averaging **80 to 100 feet**. The reefs were absolutely teeming with life, showcasing vibrant, healthy coral ecosystems bursting with massive schools of smaller fish. Turtles, groupers, eels, angelfish and more. While the diving was spectacular across the board, the personal highlights for me included spotting quite a few elusive **seahorses**, a few majestic **spotted eagle rays** gliding past in the blue, and several **octopuses**.

Island Living & Stellar Service

The accommodations were absolutely top-notch. We stayed in the key superior bungalows located right on the small island just in front of the main resort. There was nothing quite like waking up early, relaxing in the private deck hammocks, and watching the sunrise over the water.

The meals were excellent and kept us fully fueled for the heavy dive schedule. My absolute breakfast favorite was the *Huevos Rancheros*. Lunch featured a great mix of burgers, pizza, and traditional island dishes, while dinner ranged from a fresh Catch of the Day to excellent steaks—and every single meal included a solid vegetarian option. Best of all, the waitstaff quickly figured out everyone's personal preferences and were incredibly attentive and ready to help.

A Night Dive Viral Celebrity

The night dives offered some of the most memorable action of the whole trip. On multiple occasions, a clever **Schoolmaster Snapper** decided to use my dive light as its personal hunting guide, shadowing me closely to ambush prey caught in the beam. I managed to catch some wild video of it chomping a blue tang right in the light. It has already gone viral online with **over 54,000 views!** Check it out here:

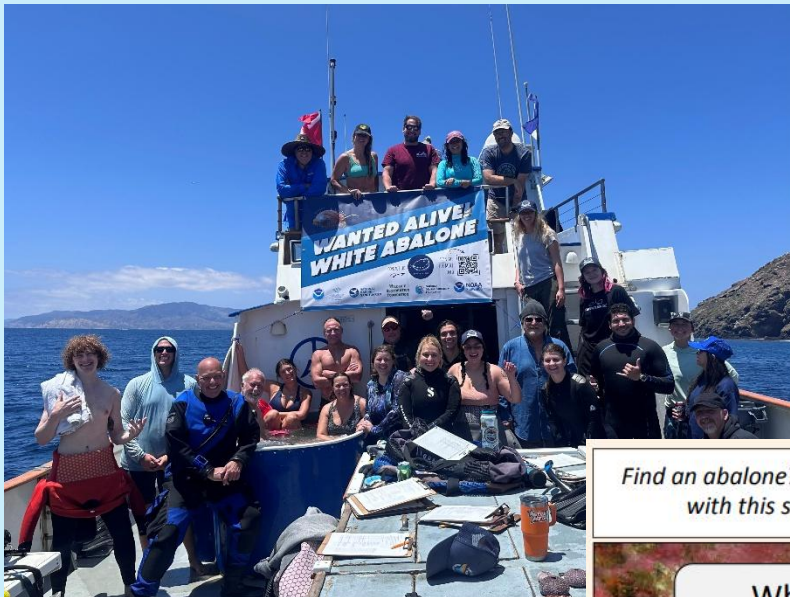
CITIZEN SCIENCE OPPORTUNITY

Findings from these dives will contribute to the understanding of population distribution and abundance. Our very own Eric Taylor (pictured below, fourth from left) participated in this a couple years ago, and was lucky enough to find a white abalone! 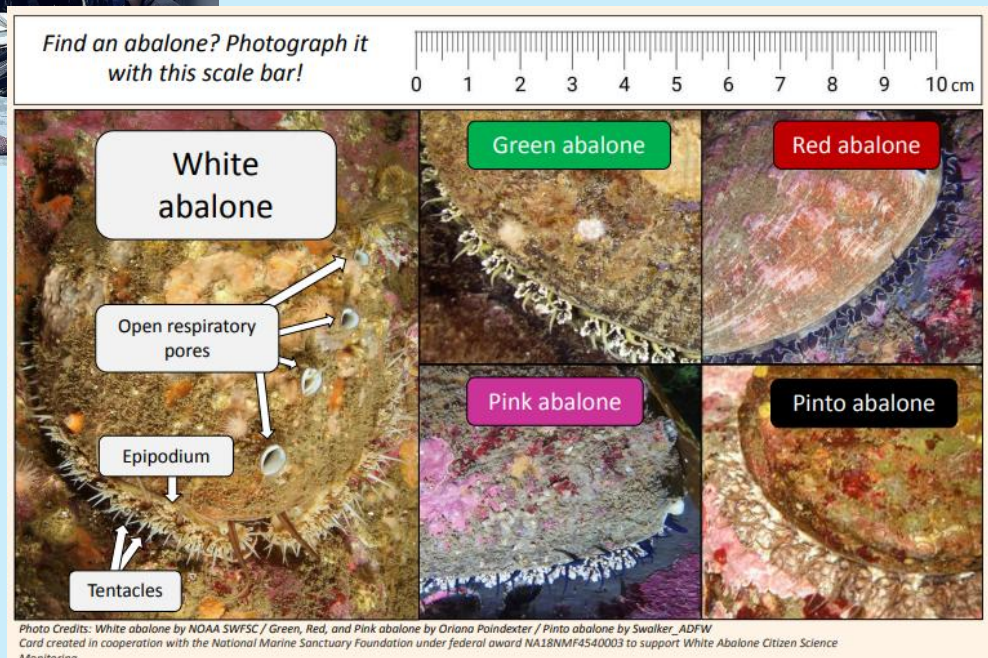

In the news:

Several petitions to alter State Marine Conservation Areas (SMCA) and/or Marine Protected Areas (MPA) are under review by the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (CDFW). Here are a few that might be of interest to CID members (there are many others state-wide):

- Anacapa Island SMCA, three options: amend to disallow commercial lobster fishing year-round; disallow hard bottomed fishing gear near eelgrass; or, extend lobster trap closure out to within 30 meters (~98.4 feet) of shore.
- Point Dume SMCA: Proposal to expand the western boundary by ~4.6 sq. miles to protect kelp forests, and to revise take restrictions to allow shore-based hook & line and spearfishing.
- Monterey-area MPAs: Changes to four MPAs near Monterey and one new MPA to support kelp forest restoration, including unlimited recreational urchin take. Proposal includes regulatory pathway to sink ships & create artificial reefs for recreational diving.

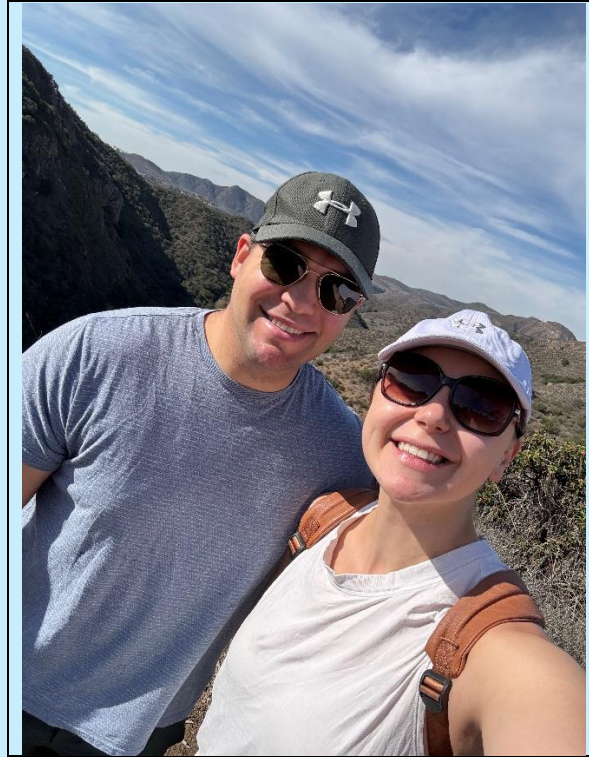

My Experience as a Board Member

This is my fifth year as a board member. I started in 2021 when the club resumed meeting again after Covid. Then-president Mike Doyon announced at the club meeting something I have become so used to hearing: “Elections are coming up and we need a few positions filled.” The response then was the same as it is now; the same as it has been year after year. Nobody raises their hand. Occasionally, someone will quietly come up to one of the board members and say that they would like to attend one of the board meetings to see how it works. That’s basically what I did.

At the first board meeting I went to, the then-Secretary handed me all of her paperwork and gave me a brief rundown of the job. I’ve joked about it; me, a secretary? You’ve got to be kidding! Well, I was, for four years until I termed out. While I was doing it, our speaker seeker stepped down so I took that on as well. Benefits of club membership

I have used the resources of the dive club to recertify myself and to get both my wife Lina and daughter Sammy certified. Sammy's first time in the ocean with a wetsuit, mask, snorkel and fins was at the 2021 Refugio Beach picnic, our annual club event. She was eight years old.

I can't say that the visibility was very good, but she saw a small fish. After the dive, we ate, and then she wanted to go back into the water. That was the start. For the next two years, every time I went on a club boat dive, she went. Lina and I would do a couple of tank dives, then I'd take Sammy with a mask, snorkel, and fins. The 3m wetsuit she had didn't keep her warm for long.

Then came the Scuba Show. We went there with the dive club. If you've gone, you've seen the pool they set up where they let new divers jump in with a tank to see what it's like to breathe underwater. Sammy brought her mask, snorkel and fins. The people at the pool put her tank on and down she went, breathing underwater for the first time in her life.

I will reveal to all of you that I am not fond of the scuba certification programs. I think they are too quick. Word got out that I was holding Sammy back because of this. Mike Doyon, a long-time instructor and club board member, approached me and said he would take Sammy through the course privately before she actually took a PADI class. That's what we did. Once Mike told me she was ready, we found an instructor through club resources. Sammy was certified at Casino Point on Catalina Island in 2023. Lina, Sammy and I dove together that afternoon. Since then, we've had incredible adventures. All of them have come by way of the Dive Club.

PRESIDENT: Develops agendas and conducts the general and board meetings. Aids board members unable to fulfill their positions, and acts as liaison between the club and its sponsors. Writes the monthly "Bottom Times" column for the newsletter.

MEMBERSHIP COORDINATOR: Greets and introduces guests, informing them of membership benefits and announces new members at club general meetings. Maintains current membership list, sends monthly updates to the board. Sends list and photos of new members to newsletter editor for publication

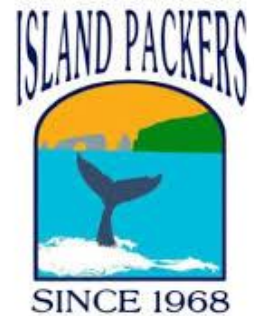
